As an element of a practice led, post graduate research project at University of Wales Trinity Saint David, Swansea, the showing of the ephemeral artefacts exhibited is a part of an enquiry into how a collaborative arts practice has intervened in a number of Stroud related land-based projects and walks. The research has focused on the development of the primarily walking/drawing practice as a way of incorporating a 'community-landscape' aesthetic into decision making about place making and landscape change.

The purpose of the research has been to study whether and how five interventions have developed the practice, added value to the local projects and generated new learning.

This book illustrates three elements of the interventions referred to as 'Collaborating', 'Encountering' and 'Exchanging'. The work exhibited is the fourth element of the practice; 'Assemblage'.

The 'Collaborating' section consists of three collages which refer to the way in which the interventions are part and parcel of community driven projects by over-laying relevant agencies, participating organisations and landscape features and values.

The 'Encountering' section is an abbreviated visual calendar showing some of the moments of engagement with and between people and landscape and as such describes some of the methods used.

The 'Exchanging' section illustrates the aspect of the practice whereby the information gathered from the encounters – how people value landscape – has been shared and disseminated,.

'Assemblage' is a metaphor for the whole process, an ephemeral artefact which is itself in transition.

The five interventions are:

Weave: a project initiated by The Stroud Local Strategic Partnership in 2010 and co-facilitated with Max

Comfort, a director of Stroud Common Wealth. The purpose being to explore what the wider community hopes to gain from the Cotswolds Canal restoration project.

Folly Wood: a project to develop a framework for caring for the community owned wood on the edge of Stroud, bought in 2010. This project, initiated with Martin Large and Ben Spencer, was co-facilitated with them and other directors and active members of the Stroud Woodland Cooperative.

In-Between Places: the double catalyst for this 2012 walk between Stroud and Derby, was the 'Gainsborough's Landscapes: Themes and Variations' exhibition in Bath and the 'Affective Landscapes' conference in Derby. The purpose was to develop walking, drawing and conversation in the context of Transition Towns, with a view to envisioning and accessing new landscapes. This project was cofacilitated with Alison Parfitt. Sue Porter and other members of Gloucestershire's Facilitators' Learning Network with the support of Seb Buckton from Transition Stroud.

Transhumance Walk: for a number of years, landscape planning colleagues from Aurland, Norway have been visiting Stroud on study trips, in particular looking at community involvement in landscape


management and enterprise. The purpose of the walk in 2012 was to develop and use art-walking alongside story telling in the context of slow tourism, focussing on the transhumance farming traditions of the area. This project was co-facilitated with Jorun Barane, Morten Clemetsen, Kel Portman and Martin Large.

River Map: a project conducted during 2013 to collect information to help inform the review of the Cotswold Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty's Landscape Character Appraisal of the Stroud Valleys. The method involved ten local artists walking and responding to the River corridor and producing work for exhibitions and discussion/collection workshops in a variety of community settings. The project was co-facilitated with Walking the Land artist Kel Portman and associated artists Tara Downs, Lucv Guenot and Valerie Coffin Price along with the Cotswold Conservation Board's Mark Connelly and Stroud Nature's Steve Roberts. The Sustainable Development Fund and Stroud Community Land Trust also supported the project.
